On December 7th, 2001, Ken Hensley once again shared a stage with Uriah Heep, the band from which he walked away over two decades ago. Although Ken indicated at Heepvention 2000 that he had attempted to make amends with his former bandmates, there have been rumors of lingering animosity. This popular belief made the announcement of Hensley making a guest appearance with Heep at the Magician's Birthday Party extremely surprising. Some speculated Heep would just merely tolerate Hensley's presence on stage for the fans' benefit during this once in a lifetime event. The event was advertised as a chance for Ken to say goodbye to the fans from the stage, something that had been impossible in 1980 due to the circumstances of his departure from the band. During the week before the gig, Ken and Lee Kerslake were seen chatting and even hugging.

Catching Up With Former Heep Vocalist Stephen Fontaine

One time Heep lead singer Stephen Fontaine returned to recording in 2000 fronting a band called 'Heartache City'. Indeed the band was named after the Heep song from "Equator" - which Fontaine loved [in fact he cites "Head First" as the first Heep album he ever bought!]. Anyway, HC saw him team up with Orange County based guitarist Ron Sachs, after they met at a gig where Fontaine was fronting his ill faited "Nightmare Carnival" act. Heartache City features a number of Ron Sachs penned tunes, as well as a few from Fontaine's past re-hashed [things demoed with past bands like Ringleader and Dirty World]. The album is a solid Metal album, boasting a few killer tracks like "If I Could Fall In Love Again", the power ballad "It Won't Be Long". "Some Gotta Win" [from Ringleader], a cover of "Respect", and most notably the powerful "Last Chance". Sachs throws in a few unique musical interludes such as "Intrigue" which piece the tunes together nicely. Fontaine sounds strong, but this is more of a metal album, very guitar heavy, where I think Fontaine sounds strained at times to be heard in the mix. The album also suffers a bit from a 'booming' mix, reminiscent of Heep's "Equator" outcome. However, it is a decent album worth checking out to hear Steve Fontaine.

Following one live gig with HC Steve up and left the band, and soon after began working with LA guitarist lain Ashley Hersey. In September 'Fallen Angel' did one show in Hollywood, but that project too is at a standstill with Hersey announcing future work with another singer. Fontaine, who's best known for his work with 'Joshua', as well as a short lived stint in Driver, Heep, and the Eddie St James Project is also currently trying to track down his past recordings and items, hopefully for a web site and collection of privately released tunes. Since the late 70s Steve did a lot of albums and demos, much of which is obscure and/or unreleased. "I've done so much stuff.......I'm like a musical whore - if people paid me, I sang!" laughs Fontaine.


The Heepsters Mailing List


THE BOOTLEG CORNER

After a lot of thought and false starts, I decided to review this bootleg, it's one of the best I've heard from 1972. OK,





it starts off with I Wanna be free, and it's one of the many highlights on this CD. All the vocals and instruments are clear, there is even some bottom to the bass. Mick's guitar solo is very good, even from this old bootleg recording you can hear what a great tone he had in the early days. Easy Livin' is an early version since it had'nt been released yet, so it has a very fresh sound to it, being the first time the audience had heard it. July Morning is next, what can be said about this except its a classic song done by a classic lineup, and still pretty new to the set list. Now Ken gets to join in on his slide guitar for Tears In my Eyes, wow as if his organ playing was nt enough, we also hear his ability to play slide, the like's of which are almost never heard by anyone else, Ken is the master of the slide. Now that Ken has his guitar strapped on why not do some jamming, I mean it is 1972, and jamming was still a part of the show. How I miss those days. Anyway we get treated to a very inspired session with solo's from everyone, it's a shame there was nt a iam like this on Live 73, or at lease a BBC recording? There's recordings frommost every other Band that was around, how did they miss Heep? The 4 studio tracks they did record just are not enough! On to Bird Of Prev. done in the classic arrangement, lwish they still played it like this. This was what they started the show off with, so the sound levels are worse than the rest of the songs, and it sounds like it was used to get David's voice warmed up quick. so he doesn't sound as well at the start. Rainbow Demon, this song is great live, Mick's guitar sounds awesome. I wish they did this in the set list for the Live 73 recording, it doesn't get better than this! Look At Yourself is played with power, and really gets rocking! Lady In Black, Ken's voice sounds so young and a little nervous. It finishes up with Gypsy, the classic intro really kicks it into high gear, they should put this intro back in. All I can say is that this shows what a great live band Heep was in the early days as well as today. It's really to bad there isn't any soundboard recordings of this band around, and very hard to believe that even the BBC doesn't have anything to offer, I can't think of any other band from those days that there isn't some kind of recording from.

In The Review Mirror

Heepsters Mailing List Rarities . Volume One

Having just joined the CHA, I was immediately eager to hear some of the "special" recordings being offered to fans - the 5 Heepsters Mailing List Rarities (HMLR 1-5) and the 3 Uriah Heep Live Archive (UHLA 1-3) CD's. So I did the only sensible thing - I BOUGHT THEM ALL! I don't normally like to buy multiple CD's at once because, inevitably, one or more will get overshadowed and receive little playing time. However, in this case, there appeared to be too many goodies to pass up. Boy was I right!!

For this issue, I will review my favorite CD of the lot. In future issues I may review more, if requested. Ironically (but, probably NOT coincidentally) My favorite is the HMLR #1. There has to be some reason that it was done first, doesn't there?

The CD has a little bit of everything for all Heep Era fans. It starts off with 8 early vintage Byron Era live songs apparently taped from a variety of TV and radio recordings. Truth be told, this is my least favorite section of the CD. It is fun to hear the TV announcer lead off the broadcast of "In Concert" by going right into Heep. But, as can be expected from this type of recording, the source material makes the sound quality pretty rough. The one gem in this group is a totally "new" song "So Nice" (Track #8) that apparently was performed live in very early shows. Any "new" Byron era recording (live or studio) has to get you excited. This one is very blues/boogie in style, not a hard rocker, but still fun.

Up next are the real treats on this CD. Track #9. "Children of the Night". This is live vintage "Goalby" era heep from the Abominog tour. I happened to see this tour in Atlanta in 1982 and have been telling people about this song for years. I couldn't wait to hear it again. It's one of the "heavier" Goalby era tunes, sounding kind of like "Sell Your Soul" and "Night of the Wolf". Great song! Could easily be on Abominog or Head First. Next up is an early live version of "Everything in Life" from Sonic Origami. Of course that song had been written earlier in the 90's and had been in the set over the years. Interesting version. Tracks 11 & 12 make the whole CD a must have (I.M.H.O.). They are apparently taken from early "Different World" recording sessions. The thing that blows me away is how great these songs are. I know I'm not alone in this, but Different World is probably my least favorite Heep album (followed closely by Innocent Victim). So I didn't expect too much. Track 11 is titled "Powers an Addiction". It is an early version of Blood on Stone, the lead off track from Different World. The lyrics are totally different, but most importantly, the chorus is vastly changed - and much better. I like this version a lot. It could've easily been titled Holdin' On Tight (the main lyrics in the Chorus) and released instead the the latter version. Next up - track 12 - the single best song on this CD - Winds of Time. WOW what a great song!!!! I am serious, this one is awesome. I can't believe a song this good can still be floating around in the "unused/discarded" tracks bin. It starts off slow but builds to a majestic like anthem in the classic Heep vein. This one could have been on Sea of Light or Sonic Origami -it's that good. Trust me on this one - or better yet order the cd and find out yourself. One note to any audiophiles out there, remember the sound quality is less than optimal - this one sounds like it was recorded directly from a tape that had just a small amount of drag. Bernie's voice (which still sounds great) has a bit of a tremble to it. Let's just hope this one shows up somewhere in the future in clean version or a new recording.

Lastly, tracks 13 & 14 are from a Seattle radio show in 1994, where Heep had apparently recorded some live in the Studio stuff. Stealin & Easy Livin', respectively, both sound great. The harmonies are awesome. The best part is the DJ talkin' about the recording and telling his listeners that they have played it several times by request and that Heep really knocked them out live. A worthwhile end to this first "Rarities" CD.

My advice, order this one and give it a spin. I don't think you'll be sorry!
